Memories of Annfield Plain Junior School



July 1952

One September morning in 1950, the headmistress of Stanley Board School marched three of us with August birthdays out of our classroom and upstairs into the form room of the year above us. No explanation was given as we were deposited amongst a sea of new faces - and the nauseating smell of tiger lilies on the window ledges. Who remembers those double desks attached to a bench? I had to sit in one next to a girl who repeatedly made me stand up every time the teacher turned her back. Nightmare. Maths lessons were the most daunting, as decimals and fractions were totally new to us. Then came long division sums which I copied down back to front. I still occasionally do mirror-writing when stressed. The teacher couldn't work out why I was getting wrong answers when I used

the correct method of working them out. I became a bundle of nerves so my mother finally took me to the doctor's & he said "Take her away from that school." So I was sent to Annfield Plain Junior School at the beginning of January 1951. Every morning I caught the bus from Stanley - and I had lunch at Victoria House, New Durham Road, with my mother's sister Eveline and her husband. Bus fares had to be paid and finances didn't run to school dinners.

What a difference being at that school made to my life: I just loved every minute of it. The headmaster was my father's brother, Harold Seccombe, and for years I called him "sir". Miss Blanche Russell was our form tutor and she put me next to Ruby Graver - such a lovely girl: many years later I discovered she was related to June Todd - whom we all miss so much. I soon realised that pupils sat in order of merit following tests every Friday morning. (During the early 80's I met Ruby again, at an SGS parents' evening as her daughter Amanda was one of my pupils.) We seemed to relish the competition and admired those who were always the top three, namely Harry Baxter, John March and Lilian Turner. I was determined to stick in and the first week I remember being ninth after the Friday tests.

Although the school was very strict, there was such a positive, happy atmosphere and it was a pleasure to learn there. I remember the exciting mental tests we'd have in the scholarship class with Mr Golightly in charge. And how we all loved Friday afternoons when he would read stories from various classics. During hot weather, what fun we had when we would occasionally be taken into the school yard to do country dancing. I remember being off school with a bad dose of measles when word came through that I'd passed the scholarship. I still have the congratulatory postcard sent by Uncle Harold signed in his distinctive green ink ! Nineteen of us passed that year, which was incredible as it wasn't a big school. During our final week we gave a concert for parents. Lots of us were involved but these are what I remember: Elsie recited "There lived a sage in days of yore", Harry and John March sang "I thought I saw a pussycat"- in funny voices- hilarious- and I played two piano solos- Fur Elise and a Brahms waltz.

We began at SGS in September 1952 and the assembly hall, biology lab and gym with showers were all just finished - brand new – ready for us. My uniform was bought at Raymond Barnes – opposite the Theatre Royal, Newcastle, as my aunt paid for some of it. It was pale brown and only Elsie and I in our year group wore this colour. Hers was from Isaac Walton's in Newcastle. The other girls' uniforms were much darker brown - bought at Doggarts or Shimelds in Stanley. I simply hated looking different!

Many years later, 15 of us "52ers" attended the 90th birthday celebration of our school and had photos taken together. Alan and Norma Jenssen asked if we'd like to meet on a regular basis and naturally, we agreed. We gave them our contact details and have enjoyed meeting on the first Tuesday of the month ever since. In 2012, 18 of us attended the Centenary celebration of our school - easily the largest year group present. Alan began producing booklets for us at Christmas 2002 and invited us to contribute articles, stories, puzzles and jokes. During Lockdown, he produced a booklet called "52ers at Home" virtually every week which kept us busy and was a wonderful lifeline. Now the booklets are smaller and renamed "Jenssen's Journals". He sends them via email or by post or delivers them at our monthly lunches. Our next lunch is on 18th May at the King's Head Lanchester, where 14 of us are meeting the 52er Lis Dawson who is coming to the NE on a visit from Vancouver.

Nine of us from our class at Annfield Plain school are still in touch and I am so glad that I was able to transfer to that excellent school so many years ago. Strangely enough, Alan Jenssen became Headteacher of that same school in 1982 until he retired in 2000. It's a small world, isn't it?

Hill Walking Trip – Stanley Grammar School



This photograph shows a party of pupils and their teachers from Stanley Grammar School and records a Hill Walking Trip, I think, at Easter 1965. We were based at a comfortable Methodist Guest House at Barmouth, North Wales. It was open to pupils from 3rd Year upwards, hence the mix of pupils in the picture. The teachers include Mr and Mrs Watson, Mr Robson and Mr Underwood. There was at least one other there whom I do not recognise; and there was a French Assistant who came along. When we left Stanley there was a snowstorm and parents were a little concerned for our safety but in a short distance the snow had disappeared and the rest of the week the weather was quite good. However, on the first outing we climbed quite a distance and ran into snow and high winds, so some of the party descended sooner than was intended. I was one of those. The rest of the walks were more successful and overall, the trip was enjoyed by the party. On one day we ascended Cadair Idris. The other events that I recall included a football match on the beach with Mr. Watson's team defeating that of Mr Robson: the losers were given the washing up that evening. Also, Barmouth is situated on the Cambrian Coast Railway line so as a train spotter I walked across the famous footpath on its lengthy Bridge across the estuary as well as making a short rail trip by steam without telling anyone - though I did confess to a teacher afterwards without censor; but it is an experience I cherish to this day. One other snippet: we set off at the end of the week and some way on, Mr Atkinson announced that he had forgotten his walking boots so we had to return a few miles to collect. LIFE AFTER TANFIELD



MY LIFE AFTER LEAVING TANFIELD

NAME: CHERYL CAINE (née NICHOLSON) PUPIL AT TANFIELD FROM 1992 TO 1997

Hi, I'm Cheryl, after leaving Tanfield I went to college in Durham then to University in Manchester. I graduated with 1st class hons. BSc Biological

Sciences specialising in Conservation. As part of my degree I spent 4 months studying and tagging lemon sharks in Bimini, Bahamas, which was incredible. I continued to study sharks, this time sand tigers, as part of my MSc in Biological Sciences at Hull University focusing on genetics and mating behaviours. After University I returned to the Northeast and worked for the Department of Health. I then got my break in conservation, working as Regional Manager for the Northeast Wildlife Trusts urban wildlife project. Here we used infra-red motion activated cameras to show





people across the region the amazing wildlife on their doorstep. Next, I moved to the Northwest Wildlife Trust as their Marine Conservation Manager. My main role was to work to try and establish Marine Conservation Zones (MCZ's) in the Irish Sea, and I'm incredibly proud the first MCZ's were designated in 2013.

Following the birth of my wonderful daughter Thea, I moved back to the Northeast where I worked for the Marine Management Organisation for a number of years. In 2015, I began working for the RSPB as their Area Conservation Manager for the Northeast and Cumbria. This job was wide ranging and very rewarding with work including hen harrier protection and natural flood management. I then took an opportunity to work with farmers who work with wildlife and the environment across the UK to lead the development of their movement, the Nature Friendly Farming Network. I still work as a Director there today, at this critical time for nature and our climate we work to influence the future of farming through policy and farmer engagement.

In 2019 I married Paul Caine, who used to be in my class at Tanfield – although we didn't meet again till 14 years later. Paul, Thea and I have lots of pets, we love to rescue animals.



We love to

travel and see new places and wildlife, some of my favourite places are The Maldives, Egypt, Mexico and Kenya. I've also spent time in Botswana, filming, tracking leopards and reintroducing African wild dogs. I also volunteer locally with New Beginnings Cat Rescue and fundraise for The Born Free Foundation with Thea.



I still love to dance, (I'm a qualified dance and aerobics instructor), watch Star Trek and most of all spend time with my family and friends.

Miss Thornton



Many puzzled over the source of the supreme Joyce Thornton's charisma. How could more than half the class achieve distinction under her distant direction? Difficult to achieve. Does the expert teacher 'lead out' according to the Latin derivation of the word "education" or did she just inspire the aspiring? Coaching for exams beyond the school syllabus with interviews during the Christmas holidays were nothing to her. After that week of exams at college, being called Miss – Doric columns beckoned. So began the hard slog for four years – enjoyable, honestly – just to trail behind such as the future renowned producer of Blue Peter and another, a future director, advising the government.

I had an enjoyable afternoon with Joyce, all to myself. When showing her around the new building at St Mary's College Durham, there in the Junior Common Room was a wooden board with her name as Senior Woman. She looked humbly pleased. She had never mentioned it or her family members who had studied at Durham. Her nephew said she was his favourite aunt. Anyway, flowers and delicious home-made orange cake came as presents. At one point she sat on a low bed, rocking with laughter. Was it because a former SGS pupil had just obeyed her instant command to put away the cake for next week in a high cupboard – or did she secretly fancy a piece? My room-mate came under her spell and I was very proud of her. Many years later a chance meeting with St Mary's College Principal obliged me to

write a magazine article about early years in the new building. Memories were jogged with the help of the now antiquated tradition of letter writing, and widely appreciated. Did I write that article really in honour of the memory of Joyce? Would she have approved? I like to think so. **Jean Simpson**

Ted was a keen and gifted artist, as anyone who has seen his paintings will know. Alistair obviously inherited the same talent.

Eulogy for Joan

Joan was born in Stanley Co Durham where her father was a cashier at the local colliery. Joan's mother trained as a milliner and made the family clothes whilst teaching Joan sewing skills. Educated in Stanley Joan's abiding memories are of Alderman Woods Secondary, now Tanfield School where she developed her enjoyment of Latin and lifelong delight in literature, especially the Classics.

In 1939 a Presbyterian Minister encouraged Joan to apply for an open scholarship at Oxford or Cambridge University. In this mining community it was rare for anyone to go to University, particularly to Oxford or Cambridge ... and a woman at that!! So began her academic career gaining a place at Kirton College Cambridge.

Graduating from Cambridge with a BA Hons in English and a post graduate teaching certificate Joan's first post was at Heaton High School Newcastle then, 5 years later she became Head of English at Redland in Bristol. Another ten years passed and in 1958 she was back up North to take up a headship at Clitheroe in Lancashire before relocating to Carlisle County High School for girls to be nearer to her ageing parents..

Joan's final posting was at Queen Mary's a girls school in Lytham near Blackpool. It was at Lytham that she made the most progressive changes in educational and social opportunities. She created a proper advanced science course resulting in a 3fold increase in the number of students specialising in the sciences. Although a Chalk and board person, Joan was very keen on her staff using Audio visual aids to teaching, building an audio visual room at the school, with a projection booth and a screen wall. Modern technology was not for Joan though who described herself as uncomputerate, finding computers terrifying.

She herself taught Classical studies and told the students stories from memory including from Homer's Odyssey and Beowulf.
A number of staff members and pupils who were taught by Joan have remained in contact, many remembering her story telling as quite magical for them, awakening an interest in the Classics.

Brenda Craddock



We were saddened recently by the death of Brenda Craddock, former Head of RE at Tanfield from the late '70s to the mid '90s. Brenda was a well-liked and well-respected member of staff. Her last visit to the school was on the school's 110th birthday celebration in October 2022. The photo shows her with Cheryl Caine and Amy Bilton.

Following her visit to see the school, Brenda wrote an article for her local village newsletter, Lanchester's 'Village Voice,' as follows:

'Last Saturday I witnessed a total transformation when I visited the

comprehensive school where for the last 18 years of my teaching career, I was Head of Department, for the teaching of Religious Education. The school building when I taught

there was not very attractive and badly needed a lot of updating. It is over 20 years since I retired but I was asked back for the 110th anniversary of the school, which was built in 1912. It was formerly called the 'Alderman Wood School', then Stanley Grammar School and later Tanfield Comprehensive School. Today it is known as Tanfield School.

A tremendous amount of money has been spent on the building in the last two to three years and to say it has been transformed is an understatement. It provides a wonderful environment for learning and developing the growth of every individual in the school. The well-being of all pupils is of paramount importance, of course, and the emphasis is on the 'whole' child, which means spiritual, physical, emotional, social and intellectual development are all part of the curriculum. The last paragraph could apply to both our village schools. We are so fortunate in this village!

Seeing a whole school transformed inside and out, made me think of the transforming power of Jesus. The New Testament of the Bible bears witness to this in providing a fund of references when people's lives were transformed through meeting Jesus.

Sometimes we can be complacent about being a Christian but developing our own spiritual journey day by day should be ongoing all the time and Jesus can transform every part of our life, if we truly acknowledge Him as the Way, the Truth and the Life.'

After completing his PhD he immediately started working as a lecturer at Sunderland Polytechnic, which later became University of Sunderland. Here he gained a Professorship in 1993 in Renewable Energy Systems. In 2007, following his retirement from Sunderland, he became Treasurer of the Durham Branch of the WEA. Soon after (approx 2008) he joined the Tanfield Association and became President in 2011, taking over from Warren Pescod. He stepped down from this role in

2019 when Ted Brabban took over. During his retirement he has also spent time on hobbies such as painting watercolours and wood carving.

Secretary Elizabeth Hawkins



Pupil at SGS 1958-65. Lancaster University BA in English and French. Qualified as a teacher and returned to teach at Tanfield from 1970-2005, with a year or two off in the 80s to have three sons. Joined the Tanfield Association shortly before retiring in 2005 and was elected Secretary in 2012. Produced four books on Tanfield to celebrate its 80th, 90th, 100th and 110th anniversaries.


In 2012 I was invited to join the TA, having spent many months researching the life of Alderman H.C. Wood. Was asked to be Minuting Secretary.

Pupil at Tanfield 1944-51. Went to Durham University's Kings College in Newcastle, taking a Bsc, followed by a Master's in Sanitary Engineering at MIT (Massachusetts Institute of Technology). Married before going to lecture in Sierra Leone, two sons born while he and his wife lived there. Back to Scotland for 3 years, working as a consulting engineer before being invited by the government to take up an appointment at the SEATO Graduate School of Engineering (SEATOGS) in Bangkok. Stayed in Thailand for 12 years, becoming Professor at the Asian Institute of Technology. Achieved an international reputation for developing country environmental technology and served as a

consultant to several Governments and United Nations organizations. Awarded the OBE. Returned to the UK in 1976 to take up a Professorship at Newcastle, now the University of Newcastle upon Tyne. First president of the newly-formed Tanfield Association, still a member of the Working Exec.

Chris Morrison



SGS from 1961 till A levels in 1969, man on the moon year. Musically inspired by Mr. Norman Williams, inspiration which remains with me. Still performing, at present, when allowed.
