## **Terrific Turnout for Local Litter Pick**

On March 23<sup>rd</sup> 25 volunteers of all ages picked up a whopping 55 bags of rubbish in Harperley Woods, Tanfield Lea Park Woods and surrounding areas. Organised by Tanfield Lea Countryside Group (TLC) these local residents of Tanfield joined forces to look after their local woodland, to make it better for nature and better for people.

12-year-old students Thea Caine and Angel Chambers, from Tanfield School, took part in the litter pick and encourage others to join in future events. Thea said, "I don't know why people drop litter, there is absolutely no need. Litter is harmful to our environment, dangerous to wildlife and destroys the natural beauty of an area." TLC hope by raising awareness of the problem this will encourage people to take more responsibility and take any litter home with them.

Established in 2008 Tanfield Lea Countryside group have gone from strength to strength and have raised a fantastic £55,000 for their local area. Sarah Donnelly, former Tanfield student, is now the secretary of TLC and says "It was such a lovely spring day to be out with fellow litter pickers as part of the Big Spring Clean. A chance to get some fresh air, meet new people and help improve our local area for people and wildlife."

TLC work to improve the local environment in a whole host of ways by organising practical conservation activities such as this litter pick and pulling Himalayan Balsam.

# NAME **DEREK WRIGHT**PUPIL AT TANFIELD FROM **1970** TO **1975**

### MY LIFE AFTER LEAVING TANFIELD

Derek's retirement from NUFC in July 2022

I left Tanfield in 1975 to start an apprenticeship with Arsenal Football Club. Leading up to my O Levels, Dr Sharp had made it quite clear to me that if I didn't achieve good grades, he would stop me going! I lived in London for two years playing for the Youth and Reserve teams but never made the grade. I was determined to make my way and always had an interest in Medicine. While at Arsenal I would always be asking the Physio, Fred Street, questions and I think he got fed up eventually and recommended that I train as a Remedial Gymnast. This was at Pinderfields Hospital in Wakefield and I then did further training as a Physiotherapist at Bradford School of Physiotherapy. The 'advice' from Dr Sharp certainly came in handy!

After working in the NHS at Northumberland Miners Rehabilitation Centre I was contacted by Fred Street. He had recommended me for an interview at Fulham Football Club for the position of Head Physiotherapist. Malcolm McDonald, the Manager, offered me the job and I spent a further 3 years living in West London gaining great experience and making some great friends at Fulham. Dr Keith Beveridge, the Club Doctor at Newcastle United, contacted me in 1984 and asked me if I would consider going for a meeting with himself and Jack Charlton, the Manager at Newcastle. I agreed to come to Newcastle as Head Physiotherapist and started my new role in October 1984 at 26 years old. I was the only physio at the club and covered First Team home and away and all reserve games. In those days the physio also covered Sports Science, Massage, Strength and Conditioning and I organised hotel rooms and meals!

Jack Charlton left the club the next year and I would eventually work for 32 managers in my 38 years at Newcastle! I retired from Head Physiotherapist in July 2022 and I do still miss the day-to-day work and each one of my colleagues. CPD was an important part of the job, and I attended The University of Wales in Cardiff to complete a Post Graduate Diploma in Sport and Exercise Medicine. I am currently studying and training in Diagnostic MSK Ultrasound and work part time in my clinic in Jesmond, Newcastle.

I keep in contact with all my friends from school and now I am semi-retired, hopefully will see more of them!

I live in Stannington Village near Morpeth with my Wife Helen and 2 sons, Benjamin and James. My eldest son Jonathan lives and works in Abu Dhabi.


### **Fenwick Lawson**


Former Tanfield pupil Fenwick Lawson, ARCA, was recently honoured by Durham City by having a blue plaque attached to the wall of Bow Cottage, where he used to live. Fenwick, famous for his religious sculptures which adorn Durham Cathedral, Holy Island and many other religious sites in England, has enjoyed a long and illustrious career. Those of you who were at Tanfield when it was Alderman Wood School may remember the school magazine, 'Grammarian' – Fenwick designed the front cover of the Christmas 1949 issue, and those following.

## **Laurence Whittle**

We were contacted recently by Ethan Siou, whose relative Laurence Whittle went to Tanfield in the 1930s when it was still Alderman Wood School. Ethan wrote as follows:

"Generations of my family went to Tanfield school. One in particular was called Laurence Whittle and he was there when it was called Alderman Wood School in the 1930s. He died serving with the RAF in 1941 and a member of the family has told me there was a tribute in the school for all of the boys who died in the war. I also have many photos of him and his time at the school. If this is of interest to the school, I'm more than happy to send them over."

We sent details of the WW2 memorial board to Ethan, who is writing a book about Laurence. Photos of Laurence's time at AWS are below.



The following editorial comes from the 1962 edition of the school magazine, 'Grammarian', which can be found on the website, along with many others.

#### **EDITORIAL**

On looking back from the dizzy heights of the sixth form, my time at this school seems comparatively short beside the fifty years the building itself has withstood since it was founded in 1912 by Alderman Wood. Naturally this event warrants a special edition of the magazine and our thanks go to Judith Jefferson for our well-designed cover as well as to the former pupils and teachers who have contributed to make this magazine a memorable one. I think we tend to take for granted the amenities available to us now. Our predecessors were denied the luxuries of an Assembly Hall, Gymnasium and Biology laboratory since the school was first intended for ordinary secondary education. With its change in status the outward appearance of the school has changed also. So has that of the pupils! The modern schoolgirl would recoil in horror at the prospect of gymslip and thick dark-coloured stockings. Even so, the more progressive (?) amongst us insist on man-sized sweaters and bee-hive hair-dos. The school has seen numerous changes in staff and this year has added to its quota. At Easter we lost Mrs. Robertson, Miss Simpson, Miss Heslop and later Mrs. Baxter and Mr. Westwater. Also Mrs. Hardy and Miss Dixon left after holding temporary posts for a short while. We have been joined at various intervals by Miss Howles, Mr. Hewit, Mr. McArdle, Mr. Robson, Mr. Watson and Mr. Percival. We also welcome back Mr. Geddes after a year's absence. The past year has been successful both in scholastic achievement and in out of school activities. Of these various activities mention might be made of the three fourth form girls who visited Czechoslovakia and of a large party of senior pupils who invaded Holland and Belgium accompanied by a few braver members of staff. I am pleased to report that their disrupting efforts did not affect the Brussels negotiations. More seriously, congratulations must be offered to William Tyers, Eleanor Arnold and Keith Heron, who were each awarded a State Scholarship. Since this is the last year in which these Scholarships are available it seems fitting to end on this note of achievement. \*'!'

## John Maughan – Footballer Supreme

Since we are in the middle of watching the European Cup matches, it seems appropriate to think back to 1951 when ex-Tanfield lad John Maughan played for Bishop Auckland in the FA Amateur Cup. John started at Tanfield in 1939, and received great encouragement from PE teacher Mr Bob Chapman.



John left Tanfield and won a place at Keble College, Oxford, but before taking it up he had to do three years' National Service. He was

posted to Egypt, where he worked at GHQ, playing football regularly in the GHQ team. Following his discharge, he took up his place at Keble to study theology. He played for his college, then for Oxford

University and then for a side called Pegasus, made up of the best players from Oxford and Cambridge. In 1951 they won through to the final of the FA Amateur Cup. John (on the right in the photo) was described in the match programme as follows: Maughan, right back, Stanley G.S. and Keble College, Oxford. Studying theology and will shortly enter the Ministry. Oxford blue for two years and played for Pegasus last season. A dour defenceman who kicks a long ball. A tenacious tackler. In the photo you can see John living up to his 'tenacious tackler' reputation in the cup final at Wembley. Pegasus won the cup!
